I was diagnosed with multiple sclerosis in 2003 two days before Christmas. I had difficulties walking and dragged my right leg with every step. Even after spinal surgery and physical therapy, I found myself still dealing with the same issues. After an MRI and several tests, my doctor told me I had MS. I was completely overwhelmed at first, and the fear of the unknown frightened me. After the initial shock, I adopted a new look on life.

With MS, you learn that every day is a new day – some good, some bad. For me, I live every day to its fullest as if there are no tomorrows, I laugh as much as I can, and I smile because you never know who else may need to see that spark. As of 2012, I stepped away from my own medical transcriptionist business and went on disability.
